## Breathing Room: The Poetics of Space



THE OTHER DAY, I was in such a shop. As I glanced through the many Hallmark cards displayed, I was struck by how our society envisions the Mother. Card after card read "you put others' needs before your own", "your selfless love" and "you sacrificed your dreams in order to support mine." (Hallmark) Is this why we celebrate and cherish in our mothers? This absence of a person? Our mothers gave birth to us. Our mothers who gave us life ... gave us breath.

THE BOND BETWEEN a mother and child is unspeakably tangible. Its memory resides in our bodies. Its memory resides in our eyes ... and yet we see the world differently from our mothers. It is this difference which is to be celebrated. This miracle of giving birth to a new set of eyes.

KAREN TRASK'S exhibition Breathing Room is such a celebration. It is a living tribute to motherhood which encompasses timeless space.

THE FOUR SCULPTURAL WORKS (artist book, video projection, video sculpture and poetry installation) make present the mother she does not remember. Words fill the gallery with images, caresses and whispers. They are the images, caresses and whispers of a mother to a daughter and a daughter to a mother. Perhaps they even speak to the "mother" which resides in each of us. The part of ourselves which nourishes our existence.

AS ONE WALKS through the exhibition it is as though time, for a moment, stands still. Only breath is heard. As breath is taken in, so too is the artist's expressed desire for communication. As breath is released, so too are our own images and memories, forever changing the space it surrounds. Trask invites the viewer to read between the lines; between the breaths.

BREATHING ROOM is also a mediation on "relational space." The space between "confrontation and communication between two people, between two surfaces between a dream and a daily life, between here and there, then and now..." (Trask)

THE SPACE CREATED is a four dimensional poetic narrative. Word upon word is placed silently on the walls, floor, eyes, and ears. Each word makes present the reality from which the artist came ... not only as a memory but as a living interaction between mother, daughter; between viewer and artist.

BEAU COLEMAN is performance and installation artist. She has exhibited internationally and is currently on faculty at the University of Alberta.
